


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Youth Day – 16 June

This year marks the 47th anniversary of the June 16 Soweto uprising, which ended tragically with hundreds of young people brutally killed in the name of equal education. NAPTOSA, in unison with South Africa as a whole, commemorates this Youth Day under the theme, "Accelerating youth economic emancipation for a sustainable future". This is a crucial goal that requires concerted efforts from various stakeholders, including governments, educational institutions, businesses, and young people themselves. When young people have access to economic opportunities and are empowered to participate in the economy, they can contribute to their own well-being and the development of their communities. The following areas need to be prioritised to promote youth economic empowerment and sustainability:

- 1. Education and Skills Development: Enhance educational systems to provide relevant and high-quality education that equips young people with the skills needed for the future job market. Promote the 'three stream model' which makes provision for vocational and technical skills education to encourage self-employment and innovation.

- 8. Youth Participation and Leadership: Empower young people to actively participate in decision-making processes at all levels.
